The pages are broken into different sections including diagnosis and symptoms, disease management, research information, current news and overviews of new treatments and tests and much more. With links to credible organizations such as the Mayo Clinic, the American Cancer Society and others, the site is updated regularly, and information is always accurate and very current. The site also offers interactive tutorials to help you learn about diagnostic tests, treatments and other topics.

This organization has been around since 2005, but their new website was just launched in 2011. NPCCF is a volunteer-driven foundation committed to building awareness, advancing research and providing support and resources to pancreatic cancer patients and their families. Information is relevant to newly-diagnosed patients as well as patients who have been dealing with pancreatic cancer for some time. Clinical trials, research information, fundraising and awareness event information and much more is provided on the site.
